



STAGE 1 : BEGINNING THE DIVORCE PROCESS

FILE A COMPLAINT FOR DIVORCE WITH THE COURT.

The court then returns the complaint with a docket number. The first party to file is named as the **PLAINTIFF** in the case, the other is the **DEFENDANT**.

IF THERE IS A CO-RESPONDENT (IF ADULTERY IS INVOLVED)

Serve notice of the complaint to co-respondent within 30 days, if applicable. The co-respondent has the right to file an application with the court to intervene in the action. An affidavit of compliance is then filed with the court.

PLAINTIFF serves the **DEFENDANT** with the summons and complaint within 10 days of receiving filed complaint back from the court. Then **PLAINTIFF** files proof of service. The **DEFENDANT** is required to file an appearance or answer, which may include a counterclaim, within 35 days.

Did the **DEFENDANT** answer within 35 days?

SPOUSE RESPONDED, NOW WHAT?

The **PLAINTIFF** files an answer to the counterclaim within 20 days. Soon after, the court will send notices for a parenting program workshop for each party (if applicable). Each party will attend the workshop at different times.

SPOUSE DIDN'T RESPOND! NOW WHAT?

A request to enter default is filed after 35 days.

A default hearing and uncontested divorce is conducted.

Serve the **DEFENDANT** with a notice of the proposed final judgment 20 days before the default hearing. Attach the **PLAINTIFF'S** case information statement and terms of the proposed settlement.

A default hearing to obtain a judgment of divorce is then conducted.
